Lotta Nordgren, Director of Schools

The 24/25 academic year was the foundation's 31st year of operation, with continued high application pressure for both the compulsory and upper secondary schools.

At the end of the financial year, CEO and Head of Schools Amanda Hurst handed over responsibility to Lotta Nordgren, after five years of successful change management. Lotta joined the foundation 27 years ago and has since worked as both a teacher and a school leader, within the foundation as well as in municipal education.

A mobile phone ban during the school day was introduced this year in the foundation's compulsory schools. The results observed include increased social interaction among students during breaks and a higher consumption of school lunches.

Viktor, an AI teaching assistant, was developed this year for upper secondary school, aimed at facilitating planning and follow-up. It is quality-assured, as it exclusively uses the knowledge base of the foundation's schools.

Introduced during the spring term, it has been well received, and a corresponding teaching assistant for lower secondary school will be launched in the autumn term of 2025.

Art holds a prominent place at Viktor Rydberg. In January, VRG staged the musical *The Witches of Eastwick*, a great success that played to full houses.

The primary school (grades F-6) in Fisksätra, which has now completed its fourth year of operation, has developed well — a trend also reflected in the national test results. Likewise, LegiLexi's digital assessments of students' reading abilities show positive progress.

During the year, the foundation sold its real estate company to Ramsbury, which already owns a property leased by the foundation. The sale enables the foundation to focus on its core mission — running schools.

The political climate concerning the conditions for independent schools is becoming

increasingly challenging. The complex financial realities of the issue are not easily explained. It is true that both independent and municipal schools receive the same per-pupil funding, which is based on the municipal school budget. However, those who take the time to review the actual costs reported by municipal schools to Statistics Sweden (SCB) will find that their real expenses often exceed the allocated per-pupil funding by several thousand kronor. A government report published in June suggests that independent schools may face even greater disadvantages going forward.

The Viktor Rydberg Schools Foundation is well equipped for the future, having built a strong and well-functioning organization over more than 30 years.

The occasion was celebrated with an afternoon of lectures followed by a reception and entertainment by The Husbands, music teachers from the schools. The lecture series began with Jonna Bornemark, who spoke about the stages of life, the importance of imagination, and humanity's need for nature. Anu Warinowski then offered a Finnish perspective on the future of education, emphasizing the importance of teachers and students developing the skills and knowledge needed to create a sustainable future, based on research and experience from Finnish teacher education. The final lecture, given by Anders Wallensten, focused on health and well-being. Together, these three voices inspired further discussions about future conceptions of knowledge, school improvement, and well-being as central components of sustainable learning.

In October, the official inauguration of Viktor Rydberg School Nacka finally took place. The event also celebrated the school's third year of operation and the milestone of surpassing 300 enrolled students. Her Royal Highness Princess Sofia attended, cut the ribbon, and officially opened the school.

Throughout the year, all schools worked actively to improve students' goal attainment and eligibility for upper secondary and higher education. This year, VRG Djursholm increased its results, with 98 % of graduating students earning a diploma. Campus VR achieved 93 %, and VRG Sundbyberg reached 89 %, all well above the national average. The aim remains for even more students to reach their academic goals and successfully complete their programs.

The lower secondary schools also achieved excellent results.

Ninth graders' grade point averages were high, and nearly all students qualified for upper secondary school: VRS Djursholm 100 %, VRS Jarlaplan 98,6 %, and VRS Sundbyberg 98,7 %.

At VRS Nacka, students in grade 3 performed very well on the national test in Swedish — a result attributed to systematic work with language development methods.

Among the more unusual activities this year was a world record attempt at Campus VR in May, where students folded 3,134 origami dogs. After the summer, it was confirmed that this was indeed a Guinness World Record. In the same month, five students from VRS Djursholm traveled to South Africa to compete in the First Lego League Open South Africa, having qualified through competitions in both Sweden and Norway.

From the autumn term of 2024, all lower secondary schools are mobile-free during the school day. One result of this has been an increased need for chess sets, card decks, ping pong paddles,

and other equipment—indicating more physical activity and social interaction. At VRS Sundbyberg, the student café has become very popular, which even led to VRG Sundbyberg acquiring its own pool table after it became too crowded.

At the upper secondary schools, preparations have been underway for the upcoming GY25 reform, which will apply to students starting upper secondary school in autumn 2025. The main change will be the shift from course grades to subject grades, and the schools are well prepared for this transition.


During the year, VRS Jarlaplan and one school unit at Campus VR (VRG Odenplan) underwent quality reviews by the Swedish Schools Inspectorate. These reviews confirmed that our schools maintain a very high level of quality.

In summary, surveys and quality evaluations show that our students thrive at all schools — satisfaction and safety levels are high. Academic results and goal attainment are likewise excellent. Staff also report high levels of satisfaction, reflected in systematic workplace health efforts, low sick leave, and low staff turnover. Going forward, we will continue to focus on preventive work to support students' health and well-being, as well as on sustainable development in learning and education.






